## From the Pastor

"I am always the last to speak," Pastor Nadia Bolz-Weber reflects on sitting through her congregation's quarterly new member welcome events. "I tell them that I love hearing [all the reasons that drew folks to House for All Sinners and Saints] ... and I wanted them to hear me: This community will disappoint them. It's a matter of when, not if. We will let them down or I'll say something stupid and hurt their feelings ... Welcome to House for All Sinners and Saints. We will disappoint you."

Rarely do I think generalizations are useful, but this one seems, to me, to be universally true: At some point, in one way or another, community will disappoint you. Humans are imperfect, and our communities – made up of human beings – reflect that imperfection and often only expound on it.

Every year as Pride Month rolls around in June, I find myself reminded of the fact that the church of all places is not exempt from this reality. The church – with its long history of excluding those who are different (see Acts 15) – doesn't exactly have an amazing track record when it comes to not disappointing and alienating people from its pews.

And yet, every year at Pride, no matter what city I'm in, I'm also reminded how God's grace can fill in the cracks when we dare to show up and proclaim that the church doesn't have to be that way. "Awesome to see so many churches!" one Instagram user commented on a photo we shared of the parade. Another person, commenting on the same photo on Facebook, wrote, "Out of all the cemeteries [our family] could have chosen [back in 1918], I am so thankful that the church outside the cemetery is this one. I'm not religious at all and honestly don't know if I will ever be... BUT this is the one church that maybe someday I will think about joining. Progressive. Caring. Nonjudgmental. Thank you!"

Community will disappoint us. It's not a matter of *if*, but *when* and *how*. But, Pastor Nadia goes on, reflecting on her time at HFASS, "I then invite them on this side of their inevitable disappointment to decide if they'll stick around after it happens. If they choose to leave when we don't meet their expectations, they won't get to see how the grace of God can come and fill in the holes left by our community's failure, and that's just too beautiful and too real to miss."

Disappointment is real. Grief is real. Feelings of shock and betrayal are real.

And so is God's grace – time and time again, picking up the broken pieces of what God's people have shattered and somehow, some way, making us whole again.

## What's in a Logo? We're Glad You Asked!

Over the past few weeks, we've been rolling out our new St. John's logo, as you've likely seen. (If not: *Surprise! We have a new logo!*) This has been a project in the works since last November, as the council and I have been engaged with a graphic designer based out of Mississippi, a referral from a colleague of mine

referral from a colleague of mine in Illinois. (If you want to see the look that inspired me to reach out, click here.)

Why a new logo? Why now? A logo says a lot about an organization – who we are, what we value, our history, our mission and vision. The eagle has been with us for a long time, and its symbolism, associated with Saint John the Evangelist, our parochial namesake, goes back even further. That symbolism remains a part of our history and identity.

There are other symbols too. Imagine walking in to the chapel on Sand Creek Road for the first time: Coming in through the front door, what's the first thing you see? Front and center, behind the altar, is our chancel cross – itself a central symbol that has traveled with us from Central Avenue, linking us to our *history*.

But have you ever looked closer at the cross? What do you notice? Grapes. Leaves. A vine. In addition to honoring our history, this symbol honors our *center*. The cross, certainly, and also Christ the Vine – itself an ancient image in scripture and church history.

And in the gospel according to, you guessed it, *Saint John*, we read: "[Jesus said,] 'Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit."" (John 15:4-5)

A logo says a lot about an organization. Here in this logo is our *history*, our *center*, and our *future*. Rooted in tradition and centered in Christ, we are branches of a life-giving Vine, with leaves, and hearts, and hands, outstretched in service, love, and welcome, bearing good fruit, as we continue to *Worship God, Serve Faithfully, and Reach Out*.




## Lutheran Night at the ValleyCats on July 6

In partnership with the Pride Center of the Capital District, join us on Sunday, July 13, at 6:30 pm at **Emmanuel Baptist Church (275** State St., Albany) for a screening of 1946: The Mistranslation That Shifted Culture. This 2022 documentary film follows the story of tireless researchers who trace the origins of the anti-gay movement among Christians to a mistranslation of the Bible in 1946. It chronicles the discovery of never-beforeseen archives at Yale University which explain the misinterpretation of ancient Greek which led to the word "homosexuality" being introduced into the Bible for the first time.
