

Italics are notes, a leader reads plain text, all read bold text


Opening

The presiding minister invites the assembly into the confession.

The assembly keeps silence for self-examination. The leader begins the confession.

December 6 Nicholas, bishop of Myra

Nicholas was bishop for twenty-five years in a city that now is in Turkey. Given few facts about his ministry, there arose medieval legends of him as a wonderworker. Stories of his care for children led to his being named the protector of children and eventually to his evolution into Santa Claus. In some northern European places, December 6, Nicholas's death day, is the day of winter gift-giving.

One famous story tells of his providing dowries in the form of bags of gold to three impoverished young girls, to save them from prostitution. In our time, a sign displaying three gold globes denotes the shop of a pawnbroker.

Lucia, martyr

Lucy was martyred during the Diocletian persecution in 304. She was praised for her care of the poor and her dedication to her vow of virginity. Because her name means "light," and since her martyrdom occurred at the time of the medieval designation of the winter solstice, especially Scandinavia celebrates her day with a St. Lucy's (or Lucia's) Day ritual, in which a girl, wearing a wreath of burning candles in her hair, serves early morning sweets to the family and community

Lucy is shown carrying a light source, such as an oil lamp. Because of the legend that she tore out her own eyes to deter a suitor who had admired them, in art she is often shown holding her own eyes on a dish.

Katharina von Bora Luther renewer of the church

The woman whom Martin Luther called "my lord Katie" managed the family's complex household, which at times resembled a hotel, and its extended farm. Thanks largely to her success, the phenomenon of a married clergy and a socially significant parsonage became the ideal for most Protestants. The story is told that at Luther's marriage, the Archbishop Albrecht of Mainz, who opposed Luther's reforms, sent a wedding gift of twenty guilders. Martin intended to refuse the money, but Katharina, who knew their emerging financial needs, said that the money had come from the Lord, and they must keep it; and they did.


Reading

MARK 9:9-13 (NRSVUE)

⁹As [Peter, James, John, and Jesus] were coming down the mountain, [Jesus] ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. ¹⁰So they kept the matter to themselves, questioning what this rising from the dead could mean. ¹¹Then they asked him, "Why do the scribes say that Elijah must come first?" ¹²He said to them, "Elijah is indeed coming first to restore all things. How then is it written about the Son of Man, that he is to go through many sufferings and be treated with contempt? ¹³But I tell you that Elijah has come, and they did to him whatever they pleased, as it is written about him."

Prayers

Hear my prayer, O Lord; listen to my cry.

Keep me as the apple of your eye; hide me in the shadow of your wings.

In righteousness I shall see you; when I awake, your presence will give me joy.

One or more of the following prayers are said by the intercessor.

Be present, merciful God, and protect us through the hours of this night, so that we who are wearied by the changes and chances of life may find our rest in you, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

OR

O Lord, support us all the day long of this troubled life, until the shadows lengthen and the evening comes and the busy world is hushed, the fever of life is over, and our work is done. Then, in your mercy, grant us a safe lodging, and a holy rest, and peace at the last, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

OR

Be our light in the darkness, O God, and in your great mercy defend us from all perils and dangers of this night; for the love of your only Son, our Savior Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

OR

Keep watch, dear Lord, with those who work or watch or weep this night, and give your angels charge over those who sleep. Tend the sick, give rest to the weary, bless the dying, soothe the suffering, comfort the afflicted, shield the joyous; and all for your love's sake. **Amen.** OR

Eternal God, the hours both of day and night are yours, and to you the darkness is no threat. Be present, we pray, with those who labor in these hours of night, especially those who watch and work on behalf of others. Grant them diligence in their watching, faithfulness in their service, courage in danger, and competence in emergencies. Help them to meet the needs of others with confidence and compassion; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

OR

Gracious God, we give you thanks for the day, especially for the good we were permitted to give and to receive; the day is now past and we commit it to you. We entrust to you the night; we rest securely, for you are our help, and you neither slumber nor sleep; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Lord's Prayer

The intercessor leads us in the Lord's Prayer.

Gathered into one by the Holy Spirit, let us pray as Jesus taught us.

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Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those
who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial
and deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power,
and the glory are yours,
now and forever. Amen.
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Please silence your microphones.

Gospel Canticle

The presiding minister leads us in the Song of Simeon.

Guide us waking, O Lord, and guard us sleeping; that awake we may watch with Christ and asleep may rest in peace. Now, Lord, you let your servant go in peace: your word has been fulfilled. My own eyes have seen the salvation which you have prepared in the sight of ev'ry people: a light to reveal you to the nations and the glory of your people Israel. Guide us waking, O Lord, and guard us sleeping; that awake we may watch with Christ and asleep we may rest in peace.

Thanks be to God.


Almighty and merciful God, Father, + Son, and Holy Spirit, bless, preserve, and keep us, this night and forevermore. **Amen.**

THE READING FOR DECEMBER 13 LUKE 1:5-17 (NRSVUE)

⁵In the days of King Herod of Judea, there was a priest named Zechariah, who belonged to the priestly order of Abijah. His wife was descended from the daughters of Aaron, and her name was Elizabeth. ⁶Both of them were righteous before God, living blamelessly according to all the commandments and regulations of the Lord. ⁷But they had no children because Elizabeth was barren, and both were getting on in years.

⁸Once when he was serving as priest before God during his section's turn of duty, ⁹he was chosen by lot, according to the custom of the priesthood, to enter the sanctuary of the Lord to offer incense. ¹⁰Now at the time of the incense offering, the whole assembly of the people was praying outside. ¹¹Then there appeared to him an angel of the Lord, standing at the right side of the altar of incense. ¹²When Zechariah saw him, he was terrified, and fear overwhelmed him. ¹³But the angel said to him, "Do not be afraid, Zechariah, for your prayer has been heard. Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you will name him John. ¹⁴You will have joy and gladness, and many will rejoice at his birth, ¹⁵ for he will be great in the sight of the Lord. He must never drink wine or strong drink; even before his birth he will be filled with the Holy Spirit. ¹⁶He will turn many of the people of Israel to the Lord their God. ¹⁷With the spirit and power of Elijah he will go before him, to turn the hearts of parents to their children and the disobedient to the wisdom of the righteous, to make ready a people prepared for the Lord."
