

The Great Vigil of Easter

March 30, 2024 ± 7:00 p.m.



This is the night of salvation! At the Vigil of Easter, we gather around fire, word, water, bread, and wine, proclaiming through story and song that ours is a God who continuously brings life out of death. On this night we experience again the heart of God's baptismal promise and the center of our faith: we are claimed and cleansed, renewed in the death and resurrection of Christ. We gather with all the saints of every time and place to celebrate the good news: Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!

The online assembly is invited to connect remotely.

We also invite you to prepare your physical space to experience the liturgy fully:

- + As we gather around the new fire and listen to the stories of salvation history in the glow of candlelight, dim the lights of your home and light a candle nearby.
- + As the resurrection gospel is proclaimed and the lights in the sanctuary are brightened, turn on the lights in your home and set out some flowers.
- + Prepare a bowl of water during the affirmation of baptism, and dip your finger into the cool water to make the sign of the cross in remembrance of your own baptism.
- + Set out some bread (or a plain cracker) and wine (or juice) as we taste the sweetness of the first Eucharist of Easter together.

GATHERING

GREETING & WELCOME

The assembly gathers outdoors around the new fire.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

And also with you.



Friends in Christ, on this most holy night when our Savior Jesus Christ passed from death to life, we gather with the church throughout the whole world in vigil and prayer. This is the passover of Jesus Christ.

Through light and the word, through water and oil, bread and wine, we proclaim Christ's death and resurrection, share Christ's triumph over sin and death, and await Christ's coming again in glory.

BLESSING OF THE NEW FIRE

Let us pray.

A brief silence is kept before the prayer.

Eternal God, in Jesus Christ you have given the light of life to all the world. Bless this new fire, and increase in us a desire to shine forth with the brightness of Christ's rising, until we feast at the banquet of eternal light; through the Sun of righteousness, Jesus Christ our Lord.

LIGHTING OF THE PASCHAL CANDLE

The presiding minister traces the following inscription on the paschal candle:

+ Christ, yesterday and today,

A Ω the beginning and the ending.

2 To Christ belongs all time

o and all the ages;

2 to Christ belongs all glory and dominion

4 now and forever.

Amen.

The presiding minister lights the paschal candle from the new fire and says:

The light of Christ, rising in glory, dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds.

PROCESSION

The assembly follows the assisting minister, bearing the paschal candle, into the sanctuary. As you make your way to your seat, please remain standing, as you are able.

EASTER PROCLAMATION

This ancient, poetic prayer from the 4th century, known in Latin as the "Exsultet," calls on the whole earth to join Christians in the praise of God.

The prayer includes several responses, echoing the cantor: "This is the night" that darkness is vanished forever, believers are rescued from gloom, the chains of death are broken, the night is as bright as the day, peace comes to the earth, heaven and earth get joined together.


This prayer, too, includes a line in praise of the bees, God's servants, who year after year, century after century, provide the wax that burns like Christ in our midst.

The paschal candle we use tonight (from St. John's) is made by the honeybees (and humans) of Marklin Candle Company in Contoocook, New Hampshire.

The assisting minister places the paschal candle in its stand.

The cantor sings, as the ministers and ushers assist the assembly in lighting their hand candles, using the flame from the paschal candle.

Rejoice, now, all heavenly powers! Sing choirs of angels! Exult, all creation around God's throne! Jesus Christ is risen! Celebrate the divine mysteries [...] echoing the mighty song of all God's people.










FIRST READING

Creation Genesis 1:1—2:4a The resurrection of Jesus Christ is the beginning of life for us all. Just as the creator God forms the earth out of chaotic waters and shines light onto primeval darkness, so the resurrection of Christ pulls us from death through baptism into fruitful life with all the good earth and enlightens our life in Christ.

Traditionally, the Easter Vigil includes as many as twelve readings. Tonight, we use five, including the four core readings never omitted.



Deliverance at the Red Sea Exodus 14:10-31, 15:20-21



Millennia of the oppression of peoples and groups have not taught us to live in justice. If anything, humankind has only perfected the means of oppression. The liberation theologians of this century plead that the whole church, like the God of Exodus, hears the cries of the suffering people, that we like Moses lead the people to freedom and like Miriam dance at the demise of oppressors. [...] The narrative of the deliverance from Egypt gives Easter a metaphor for Christ's resurrection: The Spirit of God is turning human life upside down.



Throughout the Three Days we hear from John's gospel. The details of this beloved story, like those in other Johannine narratives, superimpose the human Jesus, conversing with others, with the divine Christ, drawing us from death into the presence of the living God. Mary's address to the gardener, "Sir," turns into her proclamation of "the Lord."

As the gospel is announced, you may trace a small cross on your forehead, lips, and breast, a prayer that the Word may dwell in our minds, on our lips, and in our hearts.

AFFIRMATION OF BAPTISM

Dear friends, on this joyful night, we give thanks for the gift of baptism as we come before God to make public affirmation of baptism into Christ.

With our siblings in faith around the world, we gather around the font this night to give thanks for the gift of baptism and new life in Christ, and we rejoice with those who are baptized into the family of God this night.

Let us pray. Merciful God, we thank you that you have made us your own by water and the Word in baptism. You have called us to yourself, enlightened us with the gifts of your Spirit, and nourished us in the community of faith. Uphold us and all your servants in the gifts and promises of baptism, and unite the hearts of all whom you have brought to new birth. We ask this in the name of Christ.

Amen.

I ask you to profess your faith in Christ Jesus, reject sin, and confess the faith of the church. Do you renounce the devil and all the forces that defy God? I renounce them.

Do you renounce the powers of this world that rebel against God? **I renounce them.**

Do you renounce the ways of sin that draw you from God? **I renounce them.**

Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

What then is the significance of such a baptism with water? It signifies that the old person in us with all sins and evil desires is to be drowned and die through daily sorrow for sin and through repentance, and on the other hand that daily a new person is to come forth and rise up to live before God in righteousness and purity forever.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God? I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit? I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

You have made public profession of your faith. Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy baptism: to live among God's faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth?

I do, and I ask God to help and guide me.

People of God,

do you promise to support and pray for one another in your life in Christ? We do, and we ask God to help and guide us.

Let us pray. We give you thanks, O God, that through water and the Holy Spirit you give us new birth, cleanse us from sin, and raise us to eternal life. Stir up in your people the gift of your Holy Spirit: the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord, the spirit of joy in your presence both now and forever.





INVITATION TO COMMUNION

This is Christ's table, and all are invited to the feast.

Following the directions of the ushers, please come forward if you wish to receive communion. First, receive a piece of bread from the presiding minister. (The bread is gluten-free, though not prepared in a gluten-free kitchen. Individually wrapped gluten-free wafers for those with more sensitive allergies are available upon request.)

Then, you may either drink from the common cup (containing wine), or choose an individual cup of wine (red) or grape juice (white) from the tray, placing your empty cup in the next tray.


If for pressing reasons of health, you are unable to consume one element or the other, please know that communion is received fully in either element alone.

If you would like to receive a blessing instead of communion, you may do so by crossing your arms over your chest to indicate this to the presiding minster.


If for reasons of limited mobility you would like communion to be brought to you where you are seated, please let an usher know.




