From the Pastor

Words have power – and words have consequences.

As Jesus' inaugural address in the gospel of Luke – and its subsequent fallout – remind us. Reading from the scroll of prophet Isaiah, Jesus chooses his words carefully, finding the place where it is written:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set free those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

But the initial amazement of the synagogue assembly quickly turns to rage, as the angry mob drives him out of their town and attempts to hurl him off a cliff. It wasn't so much they didn't like what they heard – this is "good news" after all – but to whom it applies. To a widow at Zarephath in Sidon. To Naaman the Syrian. In a word, to outsiders. The ones who haven't always gotten a place at the table. The ones who haven't always belonged.

And so jealousy consumes them. Or maybe fear of scarcity. ("Will there be enough 'good news' to go around? I should get it first; I've been here the longest!") Probably a little of both. And then to the cliff. When they realize they don't get to control this good news – that it is ultimately for all, even the people they don't like – they try to silence him.

Maybe you also heard Bishop Budde's homily at the inaugural prayer service.

(You can read a short excerpt and find links to the full manuscript and video on page 7.) Her pastoral and prophetic words, urging us to *unity*, pleading for *mercy* and *compassion*.

The accolades from the mainline progressive church came pouring in, flooding my social media. And so did the backlash, with those who *didn't* like what they heard quick to denounce the bishop's words, to hurl her off the metaphorical cliff, even one US representative who went so far as to draft a House resolution to "condemn" her homily for "promoting political bias instead of advocating the full counsel of biblical teaching."

Words have power – and words have consequences.

And let me be perfectly clear in these words:

Mercy and compassion *are* "biblical teaching."

Seeking justice and advocating for the most vulnerable among us is *biblical*. Speaking out against words and executive orders and policies that blatantly disregard the full humanity of our immigrant and LGBTQIA+ neighbors is *biblical*.

On Sunday, January 26, we celebrated Reconciling in Christ Sunday, along with welcoming and affirming congregations across this church. On RIC Sunday, we recommitted ourselves to the ongoing work of being an ever more inclusive church for all of God's beloved children, expressed boldly and aspirationally in the words of our welcome statement, as affirmed unanimously by this congregation on October 15, 2023:

Trusting in the extravagant grace of God that sets us free, we affirm the sacred worth and dignity of our siblings in Christ – of all sexual orientations, gender identities and expressions, racial and ethnic identities, ages, abilities, and socio-economic statuses.

We confess the church's complicity in systems that harm God's people, including homophobia and transphobia, sexism, racism and white supremacy, and ableism.

Together, as a community of Jesus followers, rooted in grace, we commit ourselves to the work of racial equity and anti-racism and to confronting and dismantling all systems of injustice and oppression in all we do and say.

In a church body that hasn't always been a safe place for its LGBTQIA+ members, and in many places still isn't, we need to say these words out loud.

In the face of words and actions that seek to harm our neighbors, the church is called to speak words of liberation and justice, to proclaim in word and deed God's extravagant love for all.

Perhaps now more than ever, the church is and must be a sanctuary – a safe place – for all, gathered in the name of the One who calls each of us beloved, and sent to put that love into action for the sake of those who are hurting and afraid.

The words we say, and preach, and pray, and sing, have power – power to remind us of the belovedness that is irrevocably ours in the waters of baptism, and power to sweep us up – as church together – in the current of

our baptismal covenant to continue to strive for justice and peace in all the earth.

St. John's Annual Meeting was held on Sunday, January 26, 2025 at 11 am. A minimum of 13 persons/voting members was necessary to reach our quorum. With 22 members (plus 3 guests) in attendance, we met that requirement. In addition to hearing/accepting Ministry Reports, several motions were passed, the two key being: Election of New Council Member(s): To approve the recommendation of the nominating committee to elect Karen Bielinski to a new three-year term on the congregation council, beginning in June 2025. APPROVED.

Approval of 2025 Financial Plan for Mission: To adopt the 2025 Financial Plan for Mission for St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church & Cemetery as presented and recommended by the congregation council. APPROVED.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Thank you to everyone who has stepped in to help and serve in different ways (big and small) throughout the year. I am grateful for your commitment, your faithfulness, and your generosity. Also, my thanks and appreciation to council members for your dedication to leading St. John's.

TREASURER'S REPORT

During 2024, St. John's hired a third party bookkeeper to take on many duties the previous treasurer was completing. Judy Carlson joined the team in March and has been a wonderful asset.

MUSIC MINISTRY REPORT

Saint John's Collegium

Looking back on 2024 and the past eight years... it's well and good to reflect on how the beauty and richness of liturgical music has elevated the worship life of this congregation, and how our sacred musical education mission has been realized in our youngest members. Of our twelve musicians on Christmas Eve, three started training with us while they were yet in high school. Before going off to earn a bachelors and a masters degree in violin in Boston and Montréal, William Peltz Smalley started playing and singing with us when he was a senior in high school. Mikayla Malenfant, last year's choral apprentice, just finished her first semester at the Crane School of Music. Maura Lander, our current high school apprentice, just passed her pre-screenings and will soon perform her live auditions at Ithaca College, SUNY Fredonia, and Crane.

Technical Projects

Sconces: Over the summer, I completed the custom cast-iron cross sconces; our lighting is now versatile and beautiful.

Hardwiring: To make a more reliable stream for our remote worshipers, we realized that for greatest bandwidth and video stream stability, the MacMini at the AV station should be on wired Internet, rather than WiFi.

Thermostat Upgrade: Cold air blows through a large hole so it's impossible to maintain an even temperature in winter. Pastor Josh and I decided to install a smart thermostat and remote sensors.



No doubt you have seen soundbites and endless news commentary about Bishop Mariann Edgar Budde's sermon preached at the Service of Praver for the Nation at the Washington National Cathedral on Tuesday, January 21. "With a commitment to unity that incorporates diversity and transcends disagreement, and the solid foundations of dignity, honesty, and humility that such unity requires, we can do our part, in our time, to help realize the ideals and the dream of America."


