From the Pastor

How are you? How are you really?

In a video message released this past week, Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton poses this very question - inviting us to check in with ourselves and to check in with one another, to notice the burdens we are carrying and the fears and worries that weigh on us. For many of us, these are heavy and lifedraining times - drowning in the daily swirl of constantly changing headlines in the national and global news cycles, not to mention the more personal struggles of illness, grief, loneliness, and depression closer to home.

As you are reading this, take time to check in with yourself: How are you doing?

As you are reading this, we also stand on the cusp of the church's season of Lent - a season of lengthening days, of the paradoxical journey to the cross and toward the new life of Easter.

For many of us, Lent is a season synonymous with "giving up." Giving up something (chocolate? soda?) in order to be more spiritually grounded. Or perhaps "taking on" the giving up of time ordinarily spent on something else for the sake of making time for more intentional spiritual practices.

If that works for you, great! Keep doing those things. But if the traditional Lenten disciplines of "giving up" or "taking on" feel less fulfilling and more like one more thing to do, one more thing to keep track of, one more burden ...

Good news: You don't have to do any of those things.

There's nothing that says you have to give up or take on anything during Lent. There's also nothing particularly special about Lent that restricts such spiritual disciplines to this one special season. (You really can read that devotional book in the middle of July, or try out fasting for a week in October.)

Lent is not meant to be about life restricted, but life renewed.

In our Northern Hemisphere, "Lent," from an Old English word meaning "spring," overlaps with the coming of, you guessed it, spring – a season of much-anticipated and welcome warmer days, shorter nights, and more sunshine. Spring, like its liturgical counterpart in Lent, is a season of renewal - indeed, the renewal of creation itself.

There's a theological lesson in there, as Mary Louise Bringle poetically reminds us in her Lenten hymn text:

As the winter days grow longer, drawing short the hours of night; as our eager expectation waits for Easter's dawning lightyearning people, here we gather, turning watchful eyes to you: God who blesses earth with springtime, shine within our world anew! (All Creation Sings, #924)

This Lent, I invite you, first, to check in with yourself - how are you? and then to notice where you are longing for renewal. In this season at St. John's, we have an abundance of opportunities to be renewed in community – in the special liturgies of Ash Wednesday and Holy Week, in group Bible study and personal devotions, in fellowship with Albany Lutherans Together, and more.

How can you experience *Life* **Renewed** in these Lenten days?

Ash Wednesday + March 5



On Ash Wednesday we begin our forty-day journey toward Easter with a day of fasting and repentance. Marking our foreheads with dust, we acknowledge that we die and return to the earth. At the same time, the dust traces the life-giving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. While we journey through Lent to return to God, we have already been reconciled to God through Christ. We humbly pray for God to make our hearts clean while we rejoice that "now is the day of

salvation." Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world. (from Sundays & Seasons)

12:00 pm ~ Holy Eucharist

A shortened, spoken liturgy (approx. 30 minutes) with the imposition of ashes. This service is designed especially for those who need a "lunch hour" option and may not otherwise be able to attend an evening service. A light lunch will be served after the service for those who are able to stay. (in person only)

7:00 pm ~ Holy Eucharist

A full liturgy with special music by Saint John's Collegium and the imposition of ashes. (in person and livestreamed on YouTube)

Sundays in Lent + March 9-April 6

Journey with us through the wilderness of Lent in community as together we hear the sacred stories of scripture, this year told primarily through the lens of Luke's gospel, testifying to the persistence of God's mercy despite the stubborn obstacles that get in the way.

God brings new life in unexpected ways and in the most unlikely situations. This devotional reflects on how God does this in the creation of all things, the Israelites' rescue from slavery in Egypt, the dry bones and Ezekiel, the fiery furnace, the big fish and Jonah, and more.

Life Renewed provides devotions for each day from Ash Wednesday to the Resurrection of Our Lord/Vigil of Easter (March 5—April 19).

The devotions begin with evocative images and brief scripture readings drawn from traditional Easter Vigil texts. The writers then bring their diverse voices and pastoral wisdom to the texts with quotations to ponder, reflections, and prayers.



Bible Study for Lent: Entering the Passion of Jesus



This Lent, we are joining forces with Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Bellerose (Queens), NY, for a book and video-based study *Entering the Passion of Jesus:* A Beginner's Guide to Holy Week by New Testament and Jewish Studies professor Dr. Amy-Jill Levine.

Jesus' final days were full of risk. Every move he made was filled with anticipation, danger, and the potential for great loss or great reward. Jesus risked his reputation when he entered Jerusalem in a victory parade. He risked his life when he dared to teach in the Temple. His followers risked everything when


they left behind their homes, or anointed him with costly perfume. We take risks as we read and re-read these stories, finding new meanings and new challenges. In *Entering the Passion of Jesus*, Dr. Levine explores the biblical texts surrounding the Passion story. She shows us how the text raises ethical and spiritual questions for the reader, and how we all face risk in our Christian experience.

CELEBRATE HOLY WEEK



Palm Sunday / Sunday of the Passion + April 13

Today we follow Christ from triumphal entry to the cross, each waypoint of the journey marked by Jesus' compassion for those who would betray, mock, accuse, or do violence to him. Though persecuted and beaten, Jesus the Son of God is not disgraced; instead, he asks forgiveness for those who put him to death. We have walked the Lenten pathway these forty days, each of us invited through baptism to "let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus." We enter this holy week accompanying Jesus to the cross with both grief and thanksgiving in our hearts, trusting in God's redeeming love. (from Sundays & Seasons)

Holy Wednesday + April 16

12:00 pm ~ Stations of the Cross A brief spoken contemplative liturgy following the Way of the Cross through scripture reading and prayer. (in person only)

Maundy Thursday + April 17



This evening our Lenten observance comes to an end, and we gather with Christians around the world to celebrate the Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection. Tonight we remember Christ's last meal with his disciples, but the central focus is his commandment that we live out the promise embodied in this meal. As Jesus washed his disciples' feet, so we are called to give and receive love in humble service to one another. Formed into a new body in Christ through this holy meal, we are

transformed by the mercy we have received and carry it into the world. Departing worship in solemn silence, we anticipate the coming days. (from Sundays & Seasons)

A shortened, spoken liturgy (approx. 30 minutes), designed especially for those who need a "lunch hour" option and may not otherwise be able to attend an evening service. A light lunch will be served after the service for those who are able to stay. (in person only)

Good Friday + April 18



Life and death stand side by side as we enter into Good Friday. In John's passion account, Jesus reveals the power and glory of God, even as he is put on trial and sentenced to death. Standing with the disciples at the foot of the cross, we pray for the whole world in the ancient bidding prayer, as Christ's death offers life to all. We gather in solemn devotion, but always with the promise that the tree around which we assemble is indeed a tree of life. We depart silently, and we anticipate the culmination of the

Stand with Refugees. Please Read Urgent Update from Global Refuge

Below is an urgent message from Pastor Dan Beirne, Dir. for Mobilization & Faith Relations, Global Refuge:



On January 24, 2025, Global Refuge received a stop-work order from the government calling for us to immediately stop serving the nearly 6,000 newly arrived refugees in our care. This stop-work order means that government funding that provides food, housing, education, job placement, healthcare, and basic needs has come to an immediate halt. These children and families fled war, violence, or persecution and came to the United States lawfully through the official U.S. Refugee Admissions Program. They arrived with little more than the clothes on their backs and now the support they rely on — the support they'd been promised — is being pulled out from under them. Food. Housing. Schooling. Healthcare. All stopped.

With this abrupt and unprecedented cutoff of federal funding, we must now rely solely on the generosity of private donors and supporters to fill in the gaps. We must stand with these families to let them know that when promised protections for them fail, communities like ours rise. It is possible to continue supporting a number of these 6,000 refugee clients if we receive enough support to offset the cuts from the government. Please consider supporting and helping to spread the word.


Next Faith on Tap on March 12 @ 7:45 pm




