From the Pastor

At the center of Craig Hella Johnson's moving and poignant oratorio

Considering Matthew Shepard — which I was privileged to hear sung by Albany Pro Musica earlier this month at the Troy Music Hall — is the fence. The fence to which Matthew Shepard, then a 21-year-old student at the University of Wyoming, was tied and left to die, after being brutally beaten — the victim of a hate crime simply because Matthew was gay. The fence which became a pilgrimage site in the days and weeks after Matthew's death — a place to pray, to grieve, to pay respects.

The words of a poem by Lesléa Newman (whose 2012 collection October Mourning: A Song for Matthew Shepard forms the basis of much of Johnson's piece) are sung as the fence is torn down and removed from the stage. From "The Fence (after)" ...

prayed upon frowned upon

revered feared

adored abhorred

despised idolized

splintered scarred

weathered worn

broken down broken up

ripped apart ripped away

gone

but not forgotten

Matthew's story, as told through Johnson's oratorio and Newman's poetry and remembered by history, is a passion story, as the middle movement – "Passion" – is so simply and aptly titled. Passion – from the Latin for "suffering."

As our Lenten pilgrimage continues, we inch ever closer to Holy Week – another passion story. And at its center, not a fence, but the cross. The cross on which Jesus of Nazareth, the radical first-century Jewish revolutionary who preached good news to the poor, release to the captives, and freedom for the oppressed, was hung and left to die - the victim of a self-serving empire that saw anything less than complete devotion (idolatry) as a threat to be exterminated. (Certainly no room for any of that "love thy neighbor" stuff.)

The cross which has become the subversive emblem of our faith. The cross around which we will gather on Good Friday in veneration, in prayer, in remembrance. The cross – "prayed upon / frowned upon / revered / feared / adored / abhorred..."

This Holy Week, I invite you to gather with us at St. John's to hear again this passion story, to remember the meal, the garden, the trial, the suffering, the abandonment, the cross. To dwell in the mystery of the cross *before* the empty tomb.

This Holy Week, I invite you to bear witness to *this* passion story and *all* passion stories, to stand in solidarity and prayer with all those in our world who have been and continue to be subjected to the forces of hatred and violence. To see, in the midst of it all, *the tree of life* "whose leaves hold forth the healing of the nations" (ELW 342).




Life Renewed provides devotions for each day from Ash Wednesday to the Resurrection of Our Lord/Vigil of Easter (March 5—April 19).

The devotions begin with evocative images and brief scripture readings drawn from traditional Easter Vigil texts. The writers then bring their diverse voices and pastoral wisdom to the texts with quotations to ponder, reflections, and prayers. Stations of the Cross at St. Andrew's



Maundy Thursday: New Music ~ by Dan Foster

In his Ash Wednesday sermon, Pastor Josh read A Hvmn to God the Father – a beautiful poem by English cleric John Donne (1572-1631). Recalling a hymn setting by John Hilton (c. 1599-1657), I decided to compose a full verse anthem in early 17th Century British polyphonic technique on this perfect poem. We'll sing the new work during the evening service on Maundy Thursday. After years of hearing Saint John's Collegium sing beloved motets of William Byrd and Orlando Gibbons, our congregation is familiar with the sound world of the Jacobean Era. I pray my piece reminds you of these two great composers and enriches worship as we commemorate Jesus' Last Supper on April 17.





CELEBRATE HOLY WEEK



Palm Sunday / Sunday of the Passion + April 13



Today we follow Christ from triumphal entry to the cross, each waypoint of the journey marked by Jesus'

compassion for those who would betray, mock, accuse, or do violence to him. Though persecuted and beaten, Jesus the Son of God is not disgraced: instead, he asks forgiveness for those who put him to death. We have walked the Lenten pathway these forty days, each of us invited through baptism to "let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus." We enter this holy week accompanying Jesus to the cross with grief and thanksgiving in our hearts, trusting in God's redeeming love. (from Sundays & Seasons)

Maundy Thursday + April 17



This evening our Lenten observance comes to an end, and we gather with Christians around the world to celebrate

the Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection. Tonight we remember Christ's last meal with his disciples, but the central focus is his commandment that we live out the promise embodied in this meal. As Jesus washed his disciples' feet, so we are called to give and receive love in humble service to one another. Formed into a new body in Christ through this holy meal, we are transformed by the mercy we have received and carry it into the world. Departing worship in solemn silence, we anticipate the coming days. (from Sundays & Seasons)

12:00 pm ~ Holy Eucharist
A shortened, spoken liturgy (approx. 30 minutes), designed especially for those who need a "lunch hour" option and may not otherwise be able to attend an evening service.
A light lunch will be served after the service for those able to stay. (in person only)

7:00 pm ~ Holy Eucharist
A full liturgy with the laying on of hands, footwashing, stripping of the altar, and special music by Saint John's Collegium. (in person and livestreamed on YouTube)

Good Friday + April 18



Life and death stand side by side as we enter into Good Friday. In John's passion account, Jesus reveals

the power and glory of God, even as he is put on trial and sentenced to death. Standing with the disciples at the foot of the cross, we pray for the whole world in the ancient bidding prayer, as Christ's death offers life to all. We gather in solemn devotion, but always with the promise that the tree around which we assemble is indeed a tree of life. We depart silently, and we anticipate the culmination of the Three Days in the Easter Vigil. (from Sundays & Seasons)

Plan Now to Join Book Discussion Coming in May: How We Learn to Be Brave

On January 21, 2025, Americans were introduced to the Rt. Rev. Mariann Edgar Budde, bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Washington, by way of her sermon at the inaugural prayer service at the National Cathedral. In her sermon, Bishop Budde addressed the president directly imploring him "to have mercy on the people in our country who are scared now," from those who are part of the LGBTQ+ community to immigrants and refugees. For Bishop Budde, this moment was the culmination of a lifetime spent

thinking about pivot points when we're called on to push past our fears and act with strength. In How We Learn to Be Brave (published in 2023), she teaches us that being brave is not a singular occurrence; it's a journey we choose every day. How We Learn to Be Brave is an inspirational guide to the junctures in life that, if navigated with faith and discernment, pave the way for us to become our most courageous selves – providing fortitude and insight to anyone searching for answers in uncertain times.



WORSHIP NEWS & CALENDAR

Please Note: Changes are Coming for Worship Volunteers

Beginning this Easter season, we are adapting our worship volunteer practices to what is below. Please contact <u>Pr. Josh</u> with any questions.

- The role of assisting minister will be broken down into two new roles: intercessor (prays the prayers of the people) and communion assistant (common cup). This change is designed to get more folks involved in worship leadership but in smaller roles without the stress of being "front-and-center" (like the traditional assisting minister role). These roles may be filled by the same person (as reader and communion assistant [tray] often are). On festival Sundays, the intercessor will also function as the crucifer in processions.
- All worship volunteers in any role have now been added to all roles in Planning Center Services. This does not mean you have to do everything, but it allows you to sign up for whichever role(s) you want and maybe try something new. Signups for May and June are now available. Please submit any blockout dates for May and June by Friday, April 11; remaining slots will be assigned to those who are available at that time. (Need help with Planning Center? Contact Pr. Josh.)
- The scheduling of offering counters has been suspended at this time. The offering will continue to be counted and deposited weekly on Monday mornings by office staff.

• As soon as our current batch of bread is used up, we will resume the practice of using communion wafers for all. Practically speaking, we have A LOT of communion wafers and presider hosts to use up. Theologically speaking, we have a mix of folks who prefer either the bread or wafers. Lutheran liturgical practice emphasizes the unity of the meal, and "consolidating" into a single option reflects this emphasis. (Gluten-free wafers, as well as both wine and non-alcoholic grape juice, will continue to be offered.)
